FROM THE RECTORY

The Churchwardens will start a debate on "re-wilding the Church Yard" at the Harvest Festival Service on Sunday October 1st. Indeed, this debate may have happened by the time you read this. For as long as anyone can remember Tony Liddicoat has kept the Churchyard in excellent order, in his own time and without reimbursement for materials. We are very grateful to him. However the time has long since passed when he should hang up his strimmer, and this year the moment came when new arrangements have had to be made. Withiel Parish Council, taking account of the service the Churchyards provides to the Parish, and not just the Church, have paid for six cuts this year. Five have taken place, and the sixth is about to happen.

However there is another way. Amelia Lake (of the Real Food Garden) will speak at the Harvest Festival Service of the advantages of re-wilding and the way the technique could be used in our Churchyards. The exact detail of how this could be done have yet to be worked out, but I have some personal knowledge of the process. I let my large lawn grow on past the time when the Primroses had gone over and waited until August before I mowed the now hay field. In the event I did not mow it, but put someone else's flock of sheep to work who did a very good job to our mutual advantage.

However, I do not expect sheep to be acceptable in the Churchyards, and it will be more difficult to carry out a single cut in September than if the grass had been cut regularly. Others may well think that re-wilding is just an excuse for an untidy Churchyard. Many who have relatives resting there may well regard it as "disrespectful".

Times are changing, and the Church at large is anxious to support the Climate Change debate in any way that is possible and practicable. This may be a way! There is a debate to have, and all contributions will be very gratefully accepted!

Withiel Parish Council September report.

All Councillors attended the September meeting. Also present were two members of the public and Cornwall Councillor Mrs Jenny Cruse.

Cornwall Councillors Mrs. J. Cruse has expressed her concerns about Q Class being used as a 'fall-back' to enable planning permission for new builds in the open country-side, when often these permissions do not fit in with the local neighbourhood plan. Q class is a type of permission which allows redundant buildings such as barns, stables and other agricultural buildings to be developed into residential homes and is intended to ease the pressure on housing in rural areas. She has supported the application by Withiel Village Hall for funding from the Cornwall Levelling Up Scheme via CAP (the new Camel Valley Area Partnership).

Impaired visibility at the Withiel crossroads has been reported by the Chairman, Councillor Martin Davies. This is a recurring issue and it seems that gorse has grown where a post and rail fence had replaced a hedge to improve views of oncoming traffic. The Highways Department have responded that they do not consider this a problem. This has been further challenged and the council will keep residents updated. Please remember that members of the public are free to report such things via this link: <a href="https://www.cornwall.gov.uk/transport-parking-and-streets/roads-highways-and-pavements/report-a-problem-with-a-road-or-pavement/report-issues-with-hedges-or-verges/Following the monthly meeting, there has been a site meeting with engineers from Cormac at which new signage plans previously discussed for the parish, were further developed. Once the ideas have been firmed up, there will be a public consultation to follow and we will be sure to publish and promote this so that all residents of the parish are aware of it.

Stiles on the footpath between Brooklands and the bottom of Withiel Hill have been reported as needing attention and Cormac are going to visit the site to ascertain whether improvements can be made to that stretch of footpath, in line with current specifications.

Councillors supported a planning application for a new field access in Retire Lane.

Parish Council spending totalled £966.46 for the two months since the last meeting in July and included the Clerk's salary, training fees for the Chairman and the annual contribution to the News and Views publication. The Clerk will look into securing a new savings account for funds received from Voltaise Solar Energy, so that the amount remains separated from routine spending. It is hoped that Withiel Parish Council can establish written guidelines for local applications to this fund and a suggestion from Councillor Rob Wilson that members of the public be invited to attend a meeting to discuss the funding was greeted with enthusiasm.

Councillor Simon Coy explained that Withiel Parish Council is the Trustee of the Village Hall and its role is to ensure that the Withiel Playing Fields association carries out the terms of the Trust Deed and to make sure that the Hall is not sold.

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Councillor Ms. Janet Shearer reported on the early stages of the new CAP area which will meet on 18th September 2023. She had also attended a Teams meeting of a sub group which is working to identify 'Quiet Lanes' - routes which link up for cyclists, walkers and horse riders without heavy traffic. This initiative is in partnership with Sustrans - https://www.sustrans.org.uk/. The plan is to have maps of such routes accessible by all.

There are conflicting views within the Council on solar farms: Councillor Rob Wilson was disappointed that a planning application for a new solar farm on what is currently agricultural land had been rejected which, he said, seemed at odds with their ambition to make Cornwall carbon neutral by 2030. The Chairman, Councillor Martin Davies, felt that this was not necessarily a bad thing and that agricultural land should be preserved wherever possible.

The next meeting will be on 4th October 2023 at 7.00pm in the Withiel Village Hall. All are welcome!

On 6th September 2023 along with Eddie and Stephen Horrocks I completed the South West Coast Path for the 2nd time. Initially Stephen and I set out to walk the coast of Cornwall on 23rd January 2020 starting from Cremyll on the western side of the Tamar opposite Plymouth and walked clockwise around the coast finishing at Marsland Mouth just below Hartland Quay in June 2021. We then decided to go to Poole and do



the entire path and I was surprised at how different things looked realising that I had missed some spectacular views on my first walk.

We mostly did day trips as things were a little difficult with 2 lockdowns and then all the social distancing that followed. Lily the black Labrador accompanied us on a lot of days and then on more recent trips Eddie came along.

The last days walking from Porlock Weir to Minehead was one of the hottest we experienced when even the little bits of breeze were hot on top of Selworthy Beacon so it was lovely to drop down through the woods to walk alongside the Bristol

Channel and into Minehead where we celebrated the finish not only with an ice cream but a cream tea as well.

Autumn report 2023

The closure of the Green Valley Road at Borough View has had a huge impact on the local community and surrounding villages, particularly residents accessing Bodmin Hospital. I have met with the Designer, Developer and Contractor to determine exactly why four years after being built the road needed significant repair. Essentially the road was not built to specification and failed to the point it became urgent to repair (right in the middle of the holiday season). The work is being completed but in total will have caused 3 months of disruption. Lessons must be learnt, and therefore I am particularly concerned about future large housing developments in my ward. The Levelling up Bill which is likely to be adopted in October will have an impact on the Camel Special Area of Conservation as the phosphates embargo appears to be lifted. The unsatisfactory state of the river Camel, the lack of Hospital, Doctor, School, and Dentist amenities, along with the added number of cars on our over-stretched roads and parking gives me great cause for concern. Plans to improve the water treatment works at Nanstallon and Scarlett Well need to be satisfactorily in place before any further building takes place. Concern lies around the siting on valuable carbon sequential wetlands and endangered species habitat. Cornwall Council has declared a Climate and Ecological emergency and it simply cannot be acceptable to destroy areas of such value to the community. I also am uncomfortable with proposals to build on valuable farmland, as food security and supporting our farming community is also supported by this administration.

It is therefore very important that we as a community have our say about these matters. It is my understanding this will now become part of the planning process and I urge all members of our community to take part in consultations regarding planning. Currently there is an exhibition of the Bodmin Neighbourhood Draft Plan at the Shire Hall open for public consultation, this plan will affect the surrounding villages and it is important to have your say and the https://letstalk.cornwall.gov.uk site is a valuable place to visit and keep abreast of current planning consultations and all manner of plans which will affect the environment.

As I sit here on the hottest of days I can hear the tractor in the next field bringing in the hay, a comforting and reassuring sound and one I hope we all hear for many years to come.

STRIDING OUT

With the continuous wet and dull days we have had this summer some weeks it has been hard to fit in a long walk and on one such day at the end of July there were some really heavy showers and I was blaming the inaccuracy of the weather forecast for spoiling a walk I had planned for the day. But all was not lost as by 11am the sun was out and a good, drying breeze had got up so food and water were packed and off we went to Lanivet where I parked and then set out to Helman Tor. I was walking the path for the Saint's Way but when I reached Reperry Cross instead of turning left and going past St Ingunger which is the official route I turned right and crossed the road and then took the left hand road up the hill. I occasionally drive along the road past St Ingunger and find that the amount of traffic is quite heavy being used as a cut through to Lanhydrock making it a bit awkward with a car let alone walking along with a dog which is why I go the way I do. The road joins up with the recognised route at Trebell Green and I feel sure that the pilgrims would have used this way too at times. There are a couple of gateways near the top of the hill which give the most impressive views of Bodmin town and beyond as well as back to St Breock downs before carrying on over the brow of the hill and down to Trebell Green where I picked up the official Saint's Way again.

Bearing around to the right I continued along the road to where the Saint's Way splits and where I chose to go left following the eastern route with the western route going to the right along the main roadway on the flat to Gunwen Chapel and then through Luxulyan, St Blazey, Tywardreath and then on to Fowey. I branched off here and took the dead end road uphill and reaching the stile in the fence on my left then climbed up the hill to the top of Helman Tor which provided the best spot to sit and have my sandwich. Some beautiful Belted Galloway heifers were grazing nearby, they are a breed of cattle favoured for their hardiness and ability to thrive on poor ground and are used to graze and tread down the bracken and brambles to create better habitat for various plants, birds and animals. As their name suggests they are black or dun with a broad white belt behind the shoulders.

There were a few people with children on the tor enjoying their picnics and the expansive views while the children had great fun scrambling around on the rocks.

After I had eaten I left the top of the tor and took the old walled track in the direction of Lanlivery from where the Saint's Way follows the eastern route over fields, across the A390 and then along minor roads to Golant before finishing at Fowey. I took a footpath off the track, over a wooden stile on my left and then followed signs for the Wilderness Trail down to and through Redmoor which is managed by Cornwall Wildlife Trust. Passing through tall bracken and plenty of ragwort, ideal for ticks, we left the field and took the path through the moors at the bottom. It's name sums up exactly what it is with very wet, low lying ground with large tussocks and small trees. The streams that run through here are a brownish orange due to the ores that are found in the area. (continued over)

Although the site is managed by CWT I was struck by how quiet the moor was with no audible birdsong and only a few wood pigeons flapping noisily to fly away. There was no sign that deer were on this part of the moor as there were no footprints to be seen in the damp mud and no fox or badger paths around.

Following the left hand path and coming to a concrete farm lane that leads up to Trevilmick Farm I went straight across and followed the well defined path passing some really wet ground and more reddish streams before coming to a stile and into an old dark lane which brought me out onto the council road where a right turn took me back to Trebell Green and then on to the road I was on earlier and back to Reperry Cross and Lanivet.
